Design of innovation policies

Composition of innovation policies

- How can innovation policy stimulate both the supply and the demand for innovations?
- How can Tanzania and other African countries create incentives that stimulate entrepreneurship in the agricultural sector?
- Intellectual Property Rights (IPR): is it a promoter or a hindrance of innovation?
- How can government directly stimulate innovation in young local firms? (e.g. procurement)?
- Where should funding for innovations come from?

Themes and questions...

Policy coordination

- What is the relationship between S&T policy and innovation policy?
- What is the relationship between innovation policy and other policies such as: (a) industrial policy, (b) social policies, (c) education and research policies?
- What mechanisms should be in place to ensure a coherent approach to policy?

Themes and questions...

Impact of innovation policies

- To what extent can innovations happen without policies in poor developing countries?
- What type of innovation policy interventions can have a higher impact on addressing poverty reduction and inclusion? (i.e. direct versus indirect policies)?

Innovation policy and learning

- Can we learn from the experience of the early days of the now developed countries?
- As both local and global contexts change and needs evolve, is there room for experimentation with new forms of creative institutional arrangements in developing countries?
